





Addressing gas flaring

Global Gas Flaring Reduction

- World Bank initiative launched in 2002
- 19 companies and 22 countries cooperating
- 10 years showing significant reduction
- Increased ambition level: from 140bcm to 100 bcm by 2017

Efforts are paying off



Reducing gas flaring

Public-private partnership needed

Governments and public bodies

- Support creation of local markets, pipeline networks or liquefaction facilities and help companies with granting access to international gas markets
- Put in place national energy plans laying out regulatory and economic frameworks which incentivize private investments
- Establish stable, predictable and transparent regulatory frameworks

Oil and gas companies

- Engage in dialogue with the authorities, providing clear expectations on necessary framework conditions to foster long-term investments
- Assist in developing down-stream local businesses with the necessary technical knowledge and capability to manage local gas value chains
- Adopt principles and develop best practices, driving efforts to find viable solutions to gas flaring
