

- the establishment of equitable, nondiscriminatory and reasonable environmental and energy efficiency regulations, and
- efforts to establish appropriate and relevant international standards,

- the promotion of and participation in the exchange of information relating to regulatory processes;


COOPERATION: Enhance partnership with industry and manufacturers, and cooperation with governments, policy makers and international energy related organisations, and promote the exchange of information among members in order to help them in improving the efficiency and safety of gas operations.

It's what, we believe, makes BP a natural gas partner in the rapidly changing world of LNG.





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

Message from the President

Dear Colleagues

The 2006-2009 Triennium is well under way and the reaction from the IGU membership has filled us with a deep sense of satisfaction, coupled with a new boost of confidence that this term will prove to be a highly productive one, as a result of your unwavering support.

Indeed, we have received a record amount of nominees for the Study Groups from both Charter and Associate Members, registering well above 600 professionals before the end of 2006. Furthermore, the trend at the start of 2007 hints that we should expect the final number to be even higher.

The Working and Programme Committees and Task Forces have held their first meetings, registering a strong commitment of their members. They have also initiated the projects defined in the 2006-2009 Triennial Work Programme, which was formally approved during the very successful Council meeting held in Lima, in October last year. You will find in this issue of *International Gas* the first Progress Report from the team leaders of our technical programme.

Our confidence is further sustained by the fact that IGU is not alone in supporting the world gas industry as one of the foundations for energy needs in the future. In fact, and following on from GIIGNL's 2006 General Assembly held last October in Boston where I represented IGU, this magazine is being published on the eve of the LNG-15 conference to be held in Barcelona, an event sponsored by the Union, following a long history of mutual cooperation. To mark LNG-15 we are running a feature giving a brief overview of the growing LNG business as an introduction to some of the issues which will be discussed during the conference.

Remaining on the topic of gas transportation, transmission pipeline systems are also addressed in this issue, both from an overall perspective on gas pipeline developments serving the European market, as well as on the specific issue of third party interference, a very relevant topic which we have chosen to work on during this Triennium at both the distribution and transmission levels. An article from the US-based Pipeline Research Council International (PRCI), which is affiliated to IGU, provides a fitting introduction to these topics.

You will find further valuable contributions from the USA in this magazine. The editor's article on the relationship between IGU and the American Gas Association (AGA) aptly describes the constructive spirit in which our meeting was conducted last October in Washington DC, during the 3rd World Forum on Energy Regulation. The renewed US support in this Triennium is a clear example of the revitalised relationship with AGA, which sent an observer to the founding meeting of our Union in 1931 and became a Charter Member shortly afterwards.

This spirit of cooperation has also extended to organisations outside IGU. At the end of November last year we held a very productive meeting in Paris with the International Energy Agency (IEA), where several topics of joint collaboration were identified including energy efficiency, the dialogue between gas producers and consumers, and response to energy emergencies and disruptions. Mutual support was also agreed on the future deliverables from both organisations, such as IEA's Natural Gas Market Review and IGU's 2030 Natural Gas Industry Outlook study. Further information on these developments will be given in future issues of this magazine.

We knew we had set an ambitious target for this Triennium when deciding on our theme, The Global Energy Challenge: Reviewing the Strategies for Natural Gas. However our Union has once again stood up resolutely to the challenge, which bestows on us both an honour and an increasing responsibility, reinforcing our resolve to ensure a Triennium that aims to deliver substantial and valuable results for its members.






Moving RWE's gas business ahead

RWE Gas Midstream will focus on the economic optimisation of the entire gas portfolio of the RWE Group and further strengthen and develop relationships to existing and new suppliers whereby fully utilising the growing gas exploration and production business of RWE Dea – for both pipeline gas and LNG. RWE Gas Midstream has the economic responsibility of the non-regulated physical gas midstream assets and will from this basis expand the gas capacity position of the RWE Group.

Over the years the local gas distribution company, today part of Holdigaz, has assisted IGU in many ways vis-à-vis the local authorities.

Now Holdigaz and the Swiss gas industry are assisting us further by hosting the Executive Committee (EXC) and Coordination Committee (CC), when they meet in Montreux at the beginning of May.

Apart from day-to-day business and a special workshop organised by the IGU Presidency, members of the two Committees will have the opportunity of visiting the legal base of the Union and experiencing the famous town of Montreux.

The Charter Member for the Russian Federation, Gazprom, has invited IGU to stage the 2007 Council meeting in St Petersburg, October 22-25. The last time the Council visited the city was in 1981 (when it was called Leningrad), while the Executive Committee met there in 1997 towards the end of the Danish Presidency.

St Petersburg is a beautiful city and the social programme will include a dinner at the Marble Palace, which was designed by Antonio Rinaldi on the orders of Catherine the Great and built between 1768 and 1785. It is now part of the State Russian Museum. There will also be a technical visit to the Lentransgas facility outside St Petersburg in the region of Leningradskaya.

Cooperation with IEA

In November 2006 the IGU Management had a very successful meeting with the International Energy Agency (IEA) based in Paris. Headed by President Ernesto López Anadón, IGU's delegation met Claude Mandil, the Executive Director of IEA and his colleagues to discuss further cooperation in a number of areas.

Among a number of initiatives, IEA agreed to participate in IGU's 2030 Natural Gas Industry Outlook study and to assist in the study on energy

efficiency started by Working Committee 5, while IGU agreed to assist IEA with its new annual publication *Natural Gas Market Review*, the first edition of which was launched by Mr Mandil at the World Gas Conference in Amsterdam last year.

It was also agreed that IGU members might second young employees to IEA for a limited time and I have written to all Charter and Associate Members informing them of this opportunity.

IGU supports second Belgrade gas conference

In 2004 IGU supported the International Conference on Development in the Gas Industry of South and East European Countries in Transition, which was held in Belgrade. Since this conference was very successful with some 300 delegates from 22 countries in the region attending, the Gas Association of Serbia has decided to stage a second event. The Association is the Charter Member for Serbia and IGU has agreed to assist in providing keynote speakers and by financing an award for the best papers from young engineers.

The conference is scheduled to take place June 12-15 in Belgrade and I recommend that interested readers attend. It is being organised by BBN Congress Management, which handled the previous event. Further information is available at www.bbn.co.yu/e-Gas2007.htm.

PETROSEC 2007

Behind this abbreviation lies an upcoming conference on the Petroleum Supply Chain and Security (PETROSEC) and Safety and Security of Energy Infrastructures in a Comparative View (SEIF-CV). The conference is being organised by the University of Salzburg, the European Commission's Joint Research Centre through its Institute for Energy and the US Center for Contemporary Conflict, and will take place in Salzburg, Austria, September 16-19.

As IGU Secretary General I have accepted an invitation to become a member of the Scientific Committee, which is responsible for the conference programme, and in that

capacity I am aiming to give the Union a high profile at PETROSEC through the participation of experts from the relevant IGU Committees.
